<p>New set of spellings released on Monday. Again these are consolidation words so practicing patterns we have done.</p>	<p>If we were in school, we were going to start writing short stories. As we are all apart, I thought we could write a set of stories which link together. As this is National Walking Month, I thought we could write stories about adventures which happen while out on a walk. Maybe the characters:</p> <p>a) find something that someone has lost b) get lost and need to get help c) meet someone who needs their help d) something else weird and wonderful</p> <p>Your first job is to log on to the class blog and tell me your idea for the story on the new post. I want to make sure there is enough to be able to write about and all ideas are appropriate. Make sure you have a beginning, middle and end for the story.</p>	<p>Use the 2do titled “Setting the scene” (opens on Tuesday) to describe the place where the story starts. Think about what the characters can see, hear, smell, taste and feel.</p>	<p>Create an acrostic poem about walking to gather some more ideas of what you might use in your story. An acrostic poem is a type of poem where the first letter of each line spells out a word. The most common form is where the first letters of each line spell out the word or phrase. It is best if each line has more than 1 word. (2do opens Wednesday.)</p>	<p>A new set of spellings go up on Thursday for you to have a go at. These are also words you have seen this term.</p>

<p>This week we are looking at pictograms. A pictogram is a chart which uses pictures to show information. They look a bit like a bar chart but use pictures instead of bars. Each picture could mean just one item or could mean more than one. The chart will tell you how much each picture is worth. This video is a good little explanation and shows how to do the first set of questions in your 2dos. https://youtu.be/i3Jbsxs4QqM</p>	<p>There is a set of questions in your 2dos on Pictograms. Before you start, practice counting in 2s and 5s. Remember that in pictograms that <u>the key is the most important part</u>. It says how much each picture is worth.</p>	<p>On Wednesday, a set of challenge questions on pictograms should appear in your 2dos. These are a bit trickier because they have quarter pictures in, as well as half pictures. Remember to look at the key before you start.</p>	<p>On Thursday it is Outdoor Classroom day. Go out into your local area (this could be your garden or on a walk with an adult) and do a nature survey. This means looking for all the different types of animals that you can see. While you are looking, use a tally chart to keep track of what you see. When you get back, create a pictogram of your own to show what you found. (There is a template for the tally chart and pictogram later in this document or you can make your own.)</p>	<p>On Thursday, a 2do will appear which asks you to create a pictogram using Purple Mash. The Pictogram part of purple mash is not the best and doesn’t have a place to put a key other than in the title, so it will need to go there. If you click the pictures at the bottom, you can change what appears in the Pictogram.</p>
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
It didn't fit on the table above but it is also really important that all of the children are practicing their Times Tables. I have set a repeating 2do which will come up once per week where Purple Mash will do them a quick Brain Training style Times Tables quiz.




