### Information about flu vaccination for children and young people



The flu vaccine for most children is a nasal spray. It will help protect them and the people close to them against flu. It's easy for you to make sure they get it, all you need to do is fill in the consent form and return it to the school.

#### Flu is serious

Flu spreads easily, and with society getting back to normal it is likely that flu rates will be higher this year alongside circulating COVID-19. People of any age can get flu, but children have the highest rate of infection, and flu can be serious for them. Complications can include bronchitis, pneumonia and ear infections. Some children get so ill they need to be admitted to hospital.

#### Benefits of the nasal spray flu vaccine for children

Flu vaccine helps protect children from flu and also helps stop them spreading it to family and friends. Some children can still get flu after having the vaccine but the infection is usually milder. The vaccine is a simple painless nasal spray, which gives them better protection than a flu injection. Your child will have their maximum protection starting around two weeks after having their vaccine.

#### Flu vaccines are safe

Since 2013 millions of children in the UK have had the nasal spray flu vaccine and it has been shown to be very safe. The flu vaccine cannot cause flu. Like all medicines, the nasal spray flu vaccine may cause side effects for some children. Common side effects include: a runny or blocked nose, a slight temperature, tiredness, a headache, a reduced appetite or aching muscles for a day or two after the vaccine. You can report any side effects online at: mhra.gov.uk/yellowcard or via the Yellow Card app.

#### There are very few reasons for children to miss out on their flu vaccine

It is perfectly safe for your child to have the flu vaccine if they have a cold or minor illness on the day.


Your child should NOT have the vaccine IF:

- · have had a serious allergic reaction to the vaccine or any part of it;
- · are on long-term aspirin (salicylate) treatment;
- · have needed intensive care following a severe allergic reaction to eggs or egg products;
- · have had oral steroids in the past 14 days;
- · have a wheezy chest on the day of the vaccination or in the previous three days;
- · have increased the use of their asthma inhaler in the last three days;
- · have a condition or treatment that weakens their immune system; or
- are in close contact with someone who has a very weakened immune system and needs to be isolated (for example, after a bone marrow transplant).

If your child cannot have the nasal spray because of one of these reasons, they will be offered a flu vaccine injection instead, and the school nurse will advise you on this.

The nasal spray vaccine is best for children, and like some other medicines it contains traces of highly purified porcine gelatine. If this is an issue for them, it doesn't mean your child should miss out, you can request a gelatine-free flu vaccine injection from their GP surgery. ## What if my child has a health

If your child is six months or older and has one of the following health conditions, it is important they have a flu vaccine every year, as they are at greater risk of complications from flu.

- Diabetes
- A heart problem
- A chest complaint or breathing difficulties, including asthma that requires regular steroid inhalers or tablets
- Kidney disease (from stage 3)
- Use Lowered immunity due to disease or treatment (and those in close contact with people in this group)
- C Liver disease
- A stroke or mini stroke
- A neurological condition
- O A missing spleen or a problem with their spleen
- A learning disability
- Young people with a higher body weight (body mass index of 40 or above)

Children in these groups may get their vaccine at school (up to year 11) or at their GP surgery.

#### How does a flu vaccine help?

Having a flu vaccine will help protect your child from flu. Most children and young people have their vaccine as a quick and painless nasal spray.

Protection starts around two weeks after having the vaccine. The vaccine usually offers children good protection against flu.

It also helps reduce the chance of children and young people spreading flu to others who are at greater risk from flu, such as babies, older people, and those with long-term health conditions.

Some people still get flu even after having a flu vaccine, but often with milder symptoms. Flu vaccines do not protect against colds, other respiratory viruses or other winter illnesses.

#### What type of flu vaccine is given to children and young people?

Most children and young people will get their flu vaccine as a painless nasal spray, as this is the best flu vaccine for them. The vaccine is a fine mist that is sprayed up the nose from the tip of each nostril. It can be given from the age of two. Most children are not upset after receiving a flu nasal spray

If your child misses their flu vaccine, speak to their school nurse, health visitor, GP or practice nurse about getting the vaccine.

#### The nasal spray vaccine can't be given to children and young people who are:

- · on long-term aspirin (salicylate) treatment;
- · taking steroid tablets (currently or in the last two weeks): or
- · in close contact with someone who has a severely weakened immune system (for example, after a bone marrow transplant) and is being looked after in a protected environment

### The nasal spray vaccine can't be given to anyone

- had a severe life-threatening allergic reaction to a flu vaccine (or any ingredient in the vaccine);
- a weakened immune system.
- · a wheezy chest on the day of the vaccination or in the previous three days; or
- · increased the use of their asthma inhalers in the previous three days.

If your child cannot avoid contact with someone who has severely weakened immunity, such as someone who has recently had a bone marrow transplant, you should discuss this with your health

#### Is flu serious?

Flu can be serious for children, Like COVID-19 it is caused by a virus, and some children can develop serious complications such as bronchitis, pneumonia and ear infections. Most years some children in Wales will need treatment in intensive care because of flu.

All children aged two or three years old (age on 31 August 2023), and school children from reception class up to and including year 11, will be offered a nasal spray flu vaccine this autumn or winter.

It is especially important that children and young people aged between six months and 17 years who have a long-term health condition get vaccinated, as they are at a greater risk of complications than other children if they catch flu-

This winter we may see COVID-19 and flu circulating at the same time, so it's very important for your child to get protected against flu.

Having a flu vaccine every year is one of the best ways to protect against flu.

Most children can have a flu vaccine if they have allergies. The person giving the vaccine will check to be sure it is safe to give.

Most children and young people who are allergic to egg can receive the vaccine with no problems. The small number of people who have previously needed intensive-care treatment for anaphylaxis (a rare, life-threatening allergic reaction) can be offered a flu vaccine injection instead.

#### Can the flu vaccine be given at the same time as other vaccines?

Yes, the flu vaccine can be given at the same time as most other vaccines. Speak to your health visitor, school nurse, GP or practice nurse for more advice.

#### Does the nasal spray vaccine contain gelatine?

Yes, it contains small traces of highly purified porcine gelatine, which is also used in a range of essential medicines.

The nasal spray vaccine is the best flu vaccine for children and young people. But flu injections do not contain gelatine, so if you would prefer your child to have the injection instead, contact their GP surgery so they don't miss out.

#### Does the nasal spray flu vaccine have any side effects?
